The condition of affairs in Ottawa, the Dominion Government, which allowed these men to come here, should take charge of the situation. It should provide proper immigration sheds, and also some office who should look after the arrivals until they had secured employment. As matters were now arranged if a thousand white immigrants should arrive here at one time there would be accommodations for them and their flight could be almost as bad as that of the Hindus at present.

The committee directed that a telegram should be dispatched to Ottawa stating that the Driffield was the only available place for the Hindus now here, and that prompt action was necessary.

Wire From Laurier.

Just at this juncture Mayor Bethune appeared with the following wire from Sir Wilfrid Laurier:

"I have your telegram asking permission to house in Driffield-shed at Government's expense 900 Hindus arrived in Vancouver. I would understand from such request that these Hindus are paupers and therefore liable to deportation. The Minister of the Interior will send to-morrow a special officer to deal with the question."

After discussion it was decided to revise the wire from the city to read as follows: "Hindus not paupers, but Health Officer declares situation serious from sanitary standpoint. Driffield only sanitary building available."

The above message was sent to Sir Wilfrid Laurier and also to Dr. Bryce, chief medical officer of the Bureau of Immigration.

Hospital Charges.

An appeal was made to the committee by Mr. Thomas Scotty for assistance. With his head bandaged, the result of wounds received during the recent riots, the applicant had a story which aroused the indignation of the audience. He stated that he was struck on the head by unknown parties while standing in front of the police station on Saturday night. He was taken to a hospital in an unconscious condition and received treatment there. Yesterday morning he was released, but before he was allowed to leave he was asked to pay a bill of \$50. As he was a working man, he was unable to pay the bill, and he was being held in the hospital. He considered the bill unjust but, since he had some \$60 in his possession when he entered the institution he was compelled to pay the bill with a certification of only \$5.

The committee expressed strong indignation at the conditions presented and advised the applicant to consult the Assistant City Solicitor, who would probably take up his case.

Ald. Bird made an appeal on behalf of Mrs. Ferguson, residing at Ninth Avenue and Bridge Street. He said the woman had gone to the expense of building a retaining wall about her property at the cost of \$300 on the alleged promise of the city to build in the roadway to her fence line. Instead of doing this, the city had been erected which prevented any access to her property. The Engineer was instructed to report on the matter.

City Engineer's statement reported in favor of giving some Vancouver residents living on Sixteenth Avenue access to the city sewer, and the committee fixed an annual rental of \$15 for the privilege.

Street Fakers.

Mr. E. S. Knowlton presented a large, signed petition asking for immediate action which would prevent the sale of patent medicines, etc., on the public streets.

The City Solicitor was called in and explained that the present powers of the city did not authorize provision for the absolute prohibition of the trade, only enabling the Council to license or regulate it. The question might, however, properly be covered through a by-law on the subject of obstructing the streets.

The committee decided that the present conditions were very unsatisfactory and asked the Solicitor to report on measures which would afford relief at the earliest possible moment.

PROGRESS BEING MADE ON CONSTRUCTION

Reports Show that Grand Trunk Pacific is Being Pushed Along Energetically.

After Berlin comes Dresden, where a clever thief broke into the mineralogical department of the Zwinger Gallery and stole thirty-three loose diamonds, each about the size of a pea, several valuable jewels, especially sapphires and emeralds, and a number of gold nuggets, and pieces of other valuable metals, like platinum, iridium, etc.

The thief, who was barefooted, was seen leaving the museum and pursued, but he escaped. Extra watchmen have been engaged for the Dresden Picture Gallery, in which the celebrated Madonna, of San Sisto Raphael is held.

THEFT OF MONEY. ON BRITISH WARSHIP

Pay for Officers and Men Aggregating \$10,000 Missing—Suspected Thief Not Caught.

Plymouth, Sept. 14.—A sum of \$10,000, intended for the payment of the officers and crew of the British ship, the *Albatross*, is missing. The ship is reported to be in the Atlantic.

As the result of this discovery, a warrant has been issued for the arrest of an officer who has been reported to be in the ship.
