

### CARRIED SEVERED LEG MILES THROUGH WOODS

Terrible Accident Befel Hand-  
logger Working Alone in  
the North.

### CRAWLED TO THE SHORE.

Collapsed When He Found  
Friends and Died Soon  
Afterward.

**C**ARRYING his severed right leg with him, Daniel Stetson, a handlogger, crawled through two miles of bush to tidewater at Toba Inlet, got into a boat and rowed another two miles down coast to a logging camp before finally collapsing. Stetson was handlogging in the country back of Toba Inlet. He was working alone, and on Monday while felling a tree, was caught by the timber as it fell. It crushed his right leg into a shapeless mass, practically tearing it off, and Stetson completed the work by cutting the shreds of skin which remained.

He was a man of iron determination and courage, and although bleeding to death, he retained consciousness, and laboriously made his way through the bush to the coast. Foot by foot he crawled over logs and through swamp until he reached the water's edge, suffering untold agony he got into a boat and managed to reach a small camp two miles away. Then he collapsed, and the men procured the lurch Dolphin and took him into Lund. From there he was conveyed to Van Anda Hospital where every attempt was made to save his life, but the shock and loss of blood had been too much, and he died on Tuesday. The body was brought down to Vancouver on the Cassiar in charge of Fred Thullin.

Stetson was forty-four years of age and a native of Ohio. The funeral takes place from the undertaking parlors of Green & Simpson to-morrow.

### HINDUS RELEASED ON HABEAS CORPUS

Validity of Order in Council as  
Applied to Them Not Tested  
Because of Point of Techni-  
cal Neglect.

"If you wish to test the order in Council you will have to go out and corral some more Hindus," was the advice tendered by Mr. Justice Morrison this morning to Mr. Elmer Jones, appearing for the Dominion in opposition to habeas corpus proceedings for the release of three Hindus who arrived in Vancouver two weeks ago on the steamer Aorangi from Suva.

It was not the fault of Mr. Jones that the order in Council could not be tested on these Hindus who were ordered released because they had never been informed why they had been detained. This was the sole ground for their release and they are not yet out of trouble.

Immediately the decision of Mr. Justice Morrison became known, Provincial Constable Munro, set out for the Dominion detention shed on the run in order to "Natalize" the immigrants. He was there ahead of the release order; however, and not till this afternoon will he have opportunity to run them through the tanning machine. Should they fail to pass, and insist on entering the country, they will be arrested and lodged with the Hindus now held in the provincial cells for having entered the province in defiance of the Natal Act.

There are now seventeen Hindus occupying the cells in the basement of the Courthouse, two more of those who reached port last Monday on the Empress of Japan from the Orient, having been arrested last night. These two were originally detained by Federal Immigration Agent Dr. Monro because they had not sufficient funds to assure their ability to support themselves. In some manner they found the necessary amount of money and last night were released only to fall into the hands of the provincial authorities.

The arrested Hindus are making life miserable around the Courthouse for every person not afflicted with a cold so bad that the olfactory nerves are paralyzed. Indescribably filthy about their persons, they insist on cooking their own food, and the vile mess they prepare in the basement sends forth a stench which by comparison would make a fertilizer factory seem like the fountain of Illac de France.
