WITHIN THE LAW.

There is to be a meeting tonight in the Dominion Hall to protest against the possibility of the Hindus on the Komagata Mare being allowed and in Vancouver. This is a mass-meeting and the protest to the authorities would naturally be ununimous. Whether It is wise to hold the meeting or not is another matter. Meetings are not always the best method of handling extremely delldate matters which are stready before the courts. The Province has consistently relterated that Canada does not desire the immigration of the Hindus. There is no misunderstanding the position. But there is no need to exaggerate. Long ago it was announced this was to be made a test case and if the law was de-fective it should have been amended then and this trouble prevented. 
