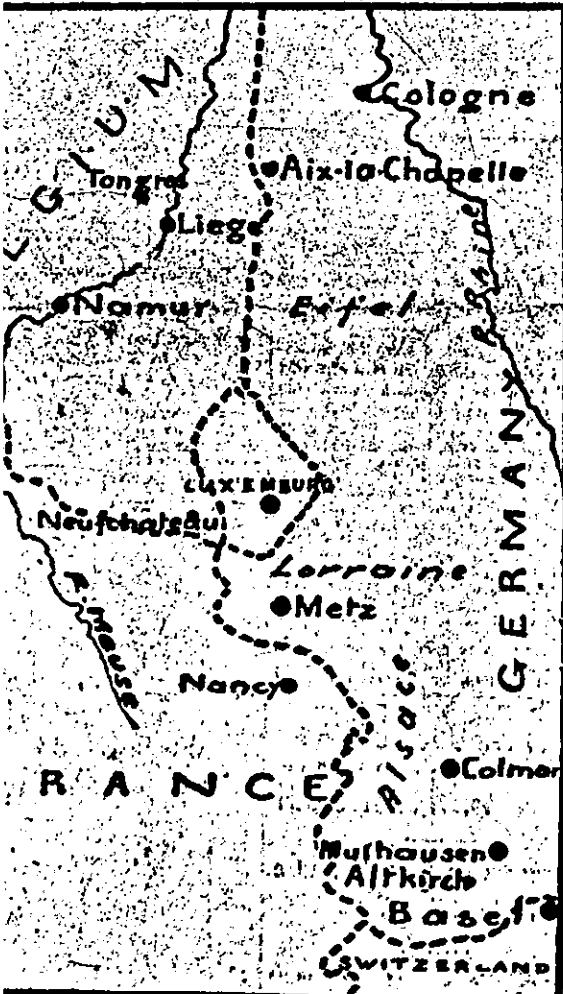

HINDUS ARE RALLYING TO EMPIRE'S DEFENCE

Delegation Has Advised Government That Whatever Internal Difficulties There May Be in India, Her People Wish to Join Whole-heartedly in Securing Victory for the Whole Empire.

London, Aug. 10, 3:45 p.m.—The North Sea was again closed to the fishing fleets today. The harbormaster at Scarborough received a message from the Admiralty instructing him to tell the masters of fishing vessels not to go out until further notice.

Ottawa, Aug. 10.—It was learned here today that the military authorities are rushing big guns to Quebec with all possible speed.

Quebec, Aug. 10.—The port of Quebec is now closed, under orders from the federal authorities. No ship will be allowed to leave.

The following ships that left Saturday or Sunday are held at Father Point: Donaldson liner Letitia; Allan liner Sicilian; Canadian Pacific liner Tyrolese; Cunard liner Alaunia, and the Drayhead of the Head line. The port of Montreal was also closed today.

New York, Aug. 10.—Pierre Mall, Belgian consul at New York, today said that, according to his advices from Belgium, only two of the forts at Liege remained standing against the German invasion. These two, he said, would be abandoned and the Belgian soldiers would retreat in good order. They would proceed to Namur and join 100,000 French troops. Namur is strongly fortified, and the consul predicted a great battle there.

Brussels, Aug. 10, via Paris, 10:40 a.m.—Information from the front confirms the report that the German troops have ceased their advance by the valley of the Ourthe. They are said to have retired on their reserves and to be throwing up defensive works. The German offensive movement to the north of Liege is developing.

London, Aug. 10.—Two divisions of Gurkhas and Sikhs have already sailed for Great Britain to share in the defence. They will not be used on the continent. A number of prominent Indians have addressed the Marquis of Crewe, secretary of state for India, assuring him that, whatever differences there may be on internal troubles in India, her people are devoted to the throne when it faces an external foe, and will join in whole-heartedly to secure victory for the Empire.

Bombay, Aug. 10.—A meeting of the most influential citizens of this city has been called for the purpose of offering to the British Government every assistance in the way of men and money. The sons of many native chiefs are begging for "the proud privilege of making a sacrifice for the Empire."

London, Aug. 10.—The Admiralty today confirmed the report that the German submarine "U15," built in 1912, had been sunk with her crew of twelve men, while she and other submarines had been making an attack on a British squadron at an unnamed place. No British craft was harmed.

London, Aug. 10, 11:40 a.m.—The Belgian legation here declared at 10 this morning, in connection with the siege of Liege:

"Up to the present everything is all right at Liege. The forts are still holding out."

Paris, Aug. 10.—It is officially announced that the French losses in the fighting at Altkirch do not exceed 100 killed and wounded.
