Calling On Backward Young Men To Enlist

English Ladies Play the Part of Recruiting Officers—Canada Held Up as Example to Britons—The Times Amiens Despatch Was Passed by Censor.

London, Sept. 1.—Boulogne, which on Sunday expected capture by the Germans, is now cheerful again and railway service between Boulogne and Paris has been renewed by an indirect route. This advance on the part of the French is of primary importance and vitally affect the entire land campaign. If successful it will automatically relieve the British lines and check the German advance upon Paris. The French troops from Lamancha are enthusiastic first-line soldiers, who have been chafing over their inaction. One result of the recent fighting has been to show that the best fighting is done by young men well under 30. Canadian recruiting officers may find this point useful.

Yesterday's debate in Parliament over the Times Sunday despatch and today's statement show that the responsibility for publishing it must be shared by Mr. F. E. Smith who, as censor, stated what passages the Times should remove, added fresh passages at the end and urged its publication. The Mail today prints a facsimile of Mr. Smith's accom-

panying the Mail correspondent's messages, which were printed in the Times on Sunday. "I have passed far more than the war office would sanction, but I think we should realize the truth," Mr. Smith writes.

The whole incident concerns the necessity of the government's making better arrangements for legitimate war correspondents forced to remain on the flanks of the armies, gathering fugitive details from refugees, can not do satisfactory work, either from a newspaper or a national point of view.

Canada is being held up by Englishmen as an example of patriotism they should imitate. Thus a correspondent of the Daily Mail calls attention to the fact that if Britain produces recruits in the same proportion as Melville, Sask., we should have 50,000 from Manchester alone and over two million from Great Britain. English women are using every possible influence to force backward young men to volunteer. One scheme is for ladies to directly canvass shop assistants and obtain their written promise to join the army. Employers are beginning to give unmarried assistants theofatfa between the army and disinclined.

HINDU FOUND DEAD WITH THROAT CUT

Harnan Singh, Former Priest, May Have Been Murdered Here.

Was Friendly to Government Officials, Said Other Hindus of Vancouver.

Harnan Singh, former Hindu priest, accused by his fellow countrymen of having given information to the immigration authorities during the trouble with the Komagata Maru passengers, is dead, and it is thought that he was foully murdered. His decomposed remains were found yesterday afternoon near the Kitsilano car barns. The throat was cut from ear to ear, presumably by a razor that was found on the ground beside him, but this, it is thought, was placed there to give the impression of suicide, as was also an empty whisky flask. The dead man's legs were bound by his turban.

With Bela Singh and Baboo Singh, the deceased had earned the reputation among his fellow countrymen of being a government agent, and it is thought that this is the reason of his having come to such a violent end. Bela Singh has repeatedly been threatened with death, and several attacks have been made upon him and his companion by the fellow countrymen, who have tried every way possible to have them removed. Bela and Baboo have been made the object of numerous Police Court prosecutions, as was also Harnan Singh, and several Hindus are now serving terms for perjury in connection with false charges brought against these men.

Harnan Singh was formerly the priest at Millside, B. C., but resigned that office, it is alleged, because of intemperate habits. He was living with Baboo Singh at 1752 Third avenue west, and since Aug. 17 had not been seen by his friend. On the following day he was seen at the post office, and was alleged to have someone that he was going to visit brother at Barish, B. C.

Fearing that he had been attacked by his enemies, Baboo Singh made enquiries and when on Aug. 20 the man did not appear, either at home in the city or at his brother's place, the immigration authorities were informed.

Yesterday afternoon Mr. F. W. Warren, 2291 First avenue west, while walking along the track near the Kitsilano car barns in the Indian reserve, saw the form of a man in the grass and bushes. He investigated and found the ghastly remains of a dead Hindu with his throat cut and his feet bound by his turban. He at once communicated with the police and the immigration authorities. The body was removed to Greene & Bertley's morgue, where it was identified as being Harnan Singh.

The police think that possibly the man may have committed suicide as he was known to have been addicted to the use of intoxicants. But this theory is scouted by the files of the deceased, who alleged that a Sikh does not use a razor, and even if he did decide to end his life he would not tie himself with his turban.
